UP PERISCOPE!

A Science Festival Event



A momentous event has happened at the North Carolina Maritime Museum at Southport! For the first time in our state's history, a cultural institution has a working periscope. Through the kindness, hard work and dedication of volunteers and the Friends of the Museum, patrons may now view the waters of the Lower Cape Fear and discover her history and geography. Please join the museum in celebrating this significant occasion with programming for all ages.

April 13 - 29

The U.S. Navy's Naval Sea Systems Command has donated and delivered a Type 14 periscope to the museum. It is the only periscope available for public viewing in North Carolina. The 33' periscope is from the USS Dolphin, a nuclear research vessel used for very deep water tasks, and is a hands-on operational experience for visitors. Housed inside the exhibit hall, and facing the windows overlooking the Cape Fear River Inlet/Atlantic Ocean, it will offer views of the reverse vista seen through the periscopes of German U-boats brutally operating offshore this region during World War II.

April 21, 10:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m. Kids of all ages will be able to build their own periscope.

A periscope is an instrument for observation from a concealed position. In its simplest form it consists of an outer case with mirrors at each end set parallel to each other at a 45-degree angle. Periscopes allow a submarine, when submerged at a shallow depth, to search visually for nearby targets and threats on the surface of the water and in the air. When not in use, a submarine's periscope retracts into the hull. A submarine commander in tactical conditions must exercise discretion when using his periscope, since it creates a visible wake and may also become detectable by radar, giving away the sub's position.

three ironclads of the Lower Cape Fear, their construction, changes in shipbuilding technology and how the environment, not weaponry brought about their demise.



The 3rd Annual Golf Tournament to support the North Carolina Maritime Museum at Southport was a rousing success. The golf carts blazed off to compete on the greens of St. James to raise money for operational funds, programs, exhibits, and the new periscope. The event was well attended and warm weather held for the day. Participants bid in the silent auction and during dinner, engaged in an exciting auction battling out who would go home with vacation packages and dinners graciously donated for the cause. A special thanks to the Friends of the Museum, area businesses, St. James and other sponsors who made this event so successful. Community support is key to the museum's continued accomplishments.

The night of March 12, 1942 found the large tanker John D. Gill on her way south from Philadelphia. A torpedo from German *U-Boat 158* struck the ship below the waterline, and oil gushed from the ruptured tank, spreading across the ocean and ignited by a carbide lamp on a life ring. Men were thrown into the burning slick, coated with thick black oil, faces blistered from fire. Rescue craft soon arrived. Eleven men from a life raft were taken on board Oak Island's Motor Lifeboat 4405; fifteen bodies were also recovered. Another fifteen survivors were later found, all taken to Southport's Dosher hospital, where nurses and hurriedly trained Red Cross Volunteer Southport women treated burns and internal injuries. Merchant Seaman Catalino Tingzon lost his life, and as no family member could be found, was given burial in a Southport Cemetery. A memorial to him and the John D. Gill was erected on the waterfront March 12, 1994. The U-158 was hunted, and less then four months later on June 30, 1942, sank with all hands.

Years later, the family of the youngest *John D.Gill* gun crew member, survi-



vor Garfield Potts of East Moline, IL, brought to the NC Maritime Museum at Southport the bible and watch he carried that day, along with his uniform and his detachment papers, as tribute to his memory. The Museum's 3rd Tuesday Adult Program on March 20, 2012 was planned and presented by Jim McKee and Bert Felton. Jim offered a 70th Anniversary powerpoint view of the historic sinking of the John D. Gill, and Bert introduced local citizens Bobby Jones, Hoyle Dosher, William Parker and Afton Smith, all present in Southport on that fateful day, and sharing their remarkable memories. Michelle Pascual of Southport reported on her research in the Philippines to find the lost family of Catalino Tingzon.


