MUSEUM RENOVATION UP-DATE

The bluff known as Fort Johnston has endured centuries of challenge and change; this year is no exception. Two one-story brick duplex apartment buildings were erected there in 1957 to house families of Military Ocean Terminal Sunny Point

(MOTSU) officers. The Commanding Officer lived with his family in the nearby Garrison House, originally built in 1810 for use as Officer's Barracks. It was extensively renovated in 1959, and is the only structure remaining from the centuries of military occupation. The scenery changed yet again as the two apartment buildings today became one, physically connected and designed to house the North Carolina Maritime Museum at South-

port. The Museum is moving from its 18-year home on Howe Street to the corner of Moore and Davis Streets, the home of historic Fort Johnston. With permission from the City of Southport, the Friends of the Museum raised funds to remodel the Moore building, now housing a large

classroom, library, staff offices and kitchen. They removed the roof from the Davis structure, replacing it with a new custom designed truss roof system, featuring a high-vaulted ceiling. This 3000-square-foot room will be the Main Exhibit Hall

and Gift Shop. For the enjoyment of visitors, a full length 100-foot porch will be reminiscent of the soldiers' barracks of 1863, and will be repeated on the Moore Street exterior. Friends and volunteers are now painting interior walls of the Office building, and as additional funding becomes available, the large Exhibit Hall walls and ceiling will be foam insulated, electrical and me-

chanical needs installed, sheet rock and flooring completed. Meanwhile the Museum staff continues regular operating hours, while preparing the current Museum artifacts for the move to the historic treasure of Fort Johnston, at the mouth of the Cape Fear River.




