Firehouse Pottery Studio's Totem Poles Visit NC Maritime Museum at Southport

Four pottery totem poles, with a local maritime theme, are calling the North Carolina Maritime Museum at Southport home for the months of November and December.

The totem pole's potters are students of Kimberly Smittle-Caroon, who teaches four pottery classes for Brunswick Community College in Southport at the *Firehouse Pottery Studio* on Nash Street. "I think this year's show, "Totem Poles and Masks", is one of our best ever."

After choosing a maritime theme, each class had to work closely together and develop the totem poles' dimensions, height, width, color scheme and attach certain pieces at just the right time while the clay was drying. "Loading these large pieces into the kilns was enough to give a person palpitations!"

The Totem Pole Show has arrived at the NC Maritime Museum at Southport. It never fails, every time someone sees the totem poles for the first time their first reaction is, "WOW!" and they are a must to see.



Bonnet's Creek was originally named Fiddler's Dreen.

Dreen is the Gullah word for drain or creek. The Gullahs, or Geechees, are Creole people who are indigenous to the coastline of the Southeastern United States, from North Carolina to Georgia. The creek's name was changed to Bonnet's Creek during modern time, as a result of the capture of the disreputable pirate, Stede Bonnet.

Fiddler's Dreen was located on the north side of Southport. In 1718, the infamous pirate, Major Stede Bonnet, hid his vessel there, repairing it for the upcoming hurricane season. It was during this time, that Colonel William Rhett was commissioned by South Carolina's Governor Robert Johnson to bring the pirate to justice.

Rhett's two ships were well manned and heavily armed. As Rhett neared the Cape Fear River, the tides were low and his ships ran aground. Bonnet could see the masts of the

two ships from where he was hidden and sent scouts to investigate. When he discovered the ships were most likely seeking pirates, he understood he was trapped. He realized his best chance was to try to slip by Rhett's ships. As the tide came in, Bonnet set sail and Rhett ordered his ships to bear down and cut off Bonnet's retreat. During the chase, all three ships became beached on the sandbars. The "Battle of the Sandbars" ensued. Soon the tide rose again and Rhett's vessel was the first to be freed. Rhett's boat raked Bonnet's *Royal James*. Major Bonnet ordered his boat scuttled but the crew refused and all of the pirates were caught. They were brought to Charleston and awaited trial for several weeks. Stede Bonnet and many of his men were eventually found guilty and hung.

People began referring to Fiddler's Dreen as Bonnet's Creek.

In later years, at the head waters of the creek near Leonard Street in Southport, communal gardens were grown. They were called the Swamp Gardens. A local fisherman by the name of Wriley Willis dredged the creek basin to build a dock for his fish house. He came upon the remains of an old wooden ship that had been put together with wooden dowels rather than iron spikes. Old bottles were also found at the site.

Today, the creek is nearly dry, with only a historical highway marker to denote it's past significance. *As told by George Willis to Leland Smith.*
