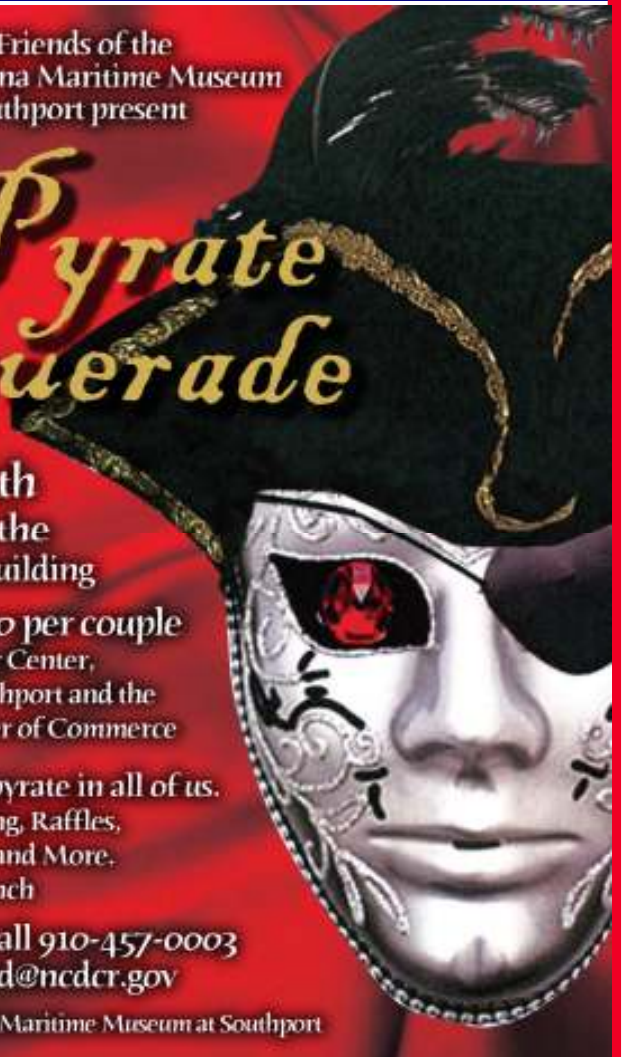

Halloween Fact or Fiction?

A beautiful dark haired woman with big brown eyes, in a long black antique dress, has been witnessed on the beaches of Confederate Point near the location of the North Carolina Aquarium at Fort Fisher. Is she frantically looking for a missing purse...that has in it about \$2,000.00 worth of gold?

The Ghost of Rebel Rose

Rose O'Neal Greenhow was a Confederate spy. The widow was nicknamed "Rebel Rose." At the beginning of the War Between the States, she lived in Washington D.C. and was a socialite. Rose knew many high ranking government officials and officers in the U.S. Army. The information she supplied the Confederate Army enabled them to win the Battle of First Manassas in 1861.

Investigated by U.S. Secret Service head Allen Pinkerton, Mrs. Greenhow was imprisoned for a while at the Old Capitol Prison with her young daughter, nicknamed "Little Rose." In prison she was able to convey intelligence through the Rebel spy network. Rose eventually gained her freedom and sailed to England as a liaison to the British and French governments. Her beauty and poise entranced the public on both sides of the Atlantic. Rose published her memoirs entitled "My Imprisonment and The First Year of Abolition Rule at Washington." She was said to be engaged to a nobleman and cultivating political support for the Confederate Cause.

After traveling in Europe for a couple of years, she started the trip home in September of 1864 on the Blockade Runner *Condor*. Rose had important dispatches in her possession and about \$2,000.00 in gold. The money was royalties from her book which she

intended to give to the Confederate Treasury for the war effort. As the *Condor* approached New Inlet, located between Confederate Point and Smith's Island, the USS *Niphon* gave chase. A gale was blowing and Rose was very nervous. She did not want to be captured by the Yankee's again. Then the *Condor* ran hard aground. Rose demanded to be put ashore immediately. The captain of the *Condor* at first refused, but in the face of Rose's hysteria, relented. As soon as the small boat was launched with Rose aboard, it capsized. Weighed down by the gold, Rose drowned.

Soldiers from Fort Fisher were called out the next few days to search for her body. Secretly, a soldier native to Brunswick County found the body. He took the gold and hid it, then pushed her body back out to sea. It was to no avail because her body was found soon thereafter. It was prepared for burial by Daisy Lamb, the fort commander's wife. Rose was wrapped in a Confederate flag and laid to rest on October 1, 1864 in Oakdale Cemetery, Wilmington with full military honors.

The young man who stole her gold was so guilt ridden, he turned himself in to the authorities and led the Confederates to the hidden gold. Years ago, a local relic hunter found an English gold sovereign, thought to be Rose's, on the beach. It was valued at \$50,000.00. Following this find of a lifetime, this middle aged man passed away prematurely. (LSmith)

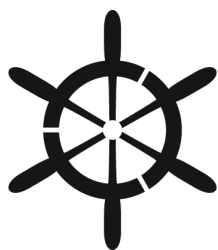

KAYAKING WITH THE KAYAK ADVENTURE CO.

We will see remnants of plantation crops, beautiful landscapes, and hear histories of our first inhabitants through modern fishermen that use the area today. Meet at the Exxon Station at the intersection of Highways 87 and 17, Winnabow.

Saturday, Oct. 29, 2011, 9:00 a.m.-12:30 p.m. Paddle the scenic blackwaters of the Lockwood Folly River and learn a little history of how the waterways were used for shipping and transportation. Hear tales and folklore associated with one of the oldest named rivers in North Carolina. Meet at Hardee's at the intersection of Highways 17 and 211, Supply.
